Course Description: What caused the great struggle between the Greeks and the Persian Empire? How did democracy come about? What was the outcome of the wars between Rome and Carthage? What were the series of events that led to the assassination of Julius Caesar? These are just some of the questions that will be examined in this course. This course will approach each question thematically where the cultural, political, and economic impact of each historical event being explored will also be discussed. We will examine ancient literary works, objects and architecture created by the Ancient Greeks and Romans, more specifically, speeches, letters, poems, archaeological artefacts like tools, weapons, coins, and sites like houses, tombs, and temples.

Core Competencies: This course will introduce students to major events in Greek and Roman history and the key themes of those events and the larger history of the ancient Mediterranean. Through assigned readings, participation in lectures, and preparation for examinations, students will increase their understanding of the ancient Mediterranean.
