# **Core Competencies:**

This course will introduce students to major events in Classical Greek history and to major themes and features of Greek society and culture. Students will gain basic understanding of the methodology of historical study. Students will demonstrate their recollection of major events and figures from the Classical period as well as their ability to engage critically with primary and secondary source material through written work.
