Course Description

This course will examine three major genres of Greek literature, namely epic, lyric and drama, and the phases of Greek culture that produced them. In the *Odyssey* the motif of the hero returning from war after a long absence, and the test of heroic values this produces, will be examined. The representation of the role of the hero's wife in recognising and re-establishing him will be a major focus. Lyric poetry will be examined in the light of the emergence of the individual and the representation of women. Athenian drama will be related to the role of sacrifice.
