Advanced knowledge of ancient Roman and Greek literature, especially the epic and drama. Comprehend the use of specific mythological legends in epic and drama. Comprehend how psychological forces determine the evolution of literature. The influence of classical literature on modern culture.

COURSE REQUIREMENTS:

1 An essay of 2000 words, due mid-term (Feb 26). Essay questions will be posted on D2L. Each question will involve the analysis of <u>two</u> of the authors studied in class. The essay will require a bibliography of at least ten items. 40%

2 A term paper of 2500 words, due at the end of term (Apr 15). Essay questions will be posted on D2L. Each question will involve the analysis of <u>two</u> of the authors studied in class (different to those discussed in the first essay). The essay will require a bibliography of at least ten items.

(Essays will be submitted electronically through the D2L drop box and they will be returned through the same medium. Extensions must be finalized before the due date.) *There will be no Registrar scheduled Final Exam for this course.*
