Course RELS 353 - Islam in the Modern World

Course Description: How is Islam today different from what it was a thousand years ago (or is it)? What are the responses to Western colonialism, the rise of nation states, and globalization by various Muslim groups and individuals? Is Islam in the West different from Islam in traditionally Muslim regions?

This course will address these and other questions within a broad historical framework, by asking, not only *what*? and *when*?, but also *why*?

During the semester will read about the history of various Islamic movements that have emerged in the last couple of hundred years, while examining the political and social circumstances of their rise. We will examine the writings of modern Muslim thinkers and will study how they have used the Islamic tradition to advocate for contemporary concerns. We will try to understand the ways Islam has been evoked to justify (sometimes violent) political action. Finally, we will look at the changing perceptions about gender among different Muslim groups in the West and in the East.

The materials covered during the course include films, studies *about* modern Islam as well as works *by* modern Muslim thinkers.

Core Competencies: Knowledge of key Muslim thinkers, political figures, and movements in the modern period; the ability to critically read and analyze religious texts; to place individuals, events, and ideas in historical perspective; the ability to express oneself with clarity orally and on paper.
