COURSE DESCRIPTION AND OBJECTIVE

This course will focus on Chinese religious and philosophical traditions, particularly Confucianism and Daoism. We will be examining primary texts and interpreting their philosophical and religious meaning. In addition, we will be studying some Chinese folk mythology, as well as Daoist religious movements and practice.

Objective: The aim of this course is to provide an overview of the philosophical and religious traditions of Daoism and Confucianism and to develop critical thinking and writing skills.

(Note: You may choose to have the exam for which you receive the highest grade worth 40% and the other exam worth 10%. If your grade is higher for the final, it would then count for 40% and the midterm would count for 40%.

ESSAY 50% (Topics will be handed out in class) Due in class November 21.

In-class exams must be written on the dates specified except in cases of illness, for which you must provide a medical note. 3% a day will be deducted for late papers. Extensions will only be granted in case of illness for which a doctor's note must be provided. Having multiple assignments due during the same time will not be accepted as a reason for extensions. It is your responsibility to plan ahead. Please keep a copy of your term paper on file in addition to the one you hand in. Please also familiarize yourself with the rules on plagiarism attached to this outline. *DO NOT PLAGIARIZE*. I have caught several students almost every year and no excuses will be accepted.
