Course Description:

Spiritual sensitivity towards the environment has a long tradition within the world's religions. This continuous link with the past through the spiritual perception of nature and its life forms has endured throughout religious and artistic perspectives. It has often been a tenacious and volatile testimony in the face of many centuries of neglect and dismissal by an increasingly secular, myopic society. This rejection of ancient insight has led to an unbalanced and sterile view of physical reality and meaning expressed in and through the environment. Initially, eco-theology, which highlights the whole "household" of God's creation, began as a late twentieth-century Christian feminist movement. However, its ideas concerning liberation of the oppressed environment quickly developed into a broader ecumenical movement with representation made by many religions. This cosmology (way of perceiving the world) identifies the decimation of the biotic web within the context of the human propensity to destroy through exploitation and domination, but seeks to offer a positive. lifeaffirming spiritual alternative.

Through lectures, readings, discussions, research, documentary, and group presentations, this course will trace the historical antecedents of eco-theology and its development into the twenty-first century. In addition to this, the material will function to identify developing ideas and issues concerning our planet. By providing scholarly analysis of pertinent texts, this course will seek to provide students with a comprehensive understanding of the potential for empowerment that many various religious/spiritual perspectives can offer in re-establishing a balanced approach to the sacred within the environment.

Learning Objectives:

- Students will develop a number of the skills identified in the University of Calgary statement of learning outcomes. These include: communication, thinking, ethical reasoning, computer literacy, information retrieval, and group effectiveness.
- The assigned readings, lecture material and methodology within the course should develop a student's ability to think critically (i.e. judge, reflect, and analyze); web notes will further provide dissemination of information and enhance computer skills; preparation for examinations should foster the development of information retrieval and writing competency.
- It is important to remember that the attainment of any learning endeavour requires that students regularly attend lectures, read the required material, and complete all course work.
