Course Description:

This course is designed to expose students to practical environmental ethics that pertain to religions, cultural stresses, economies, politics, class, race, gender, animal rights, the protection of wilderness, and the realities of globalization. Utilizing text, lectures, documentaries and discussion as the basic for enquiry, students will be encouraged to address some of the complex issues regarding the conduct of our species as part of the biotic web. Through analysis of the

course text which will cover environmental theory and practice, together with some of the specific perspectives within religions taken from the course webnotes (Gottlieb and Bender's work will be particularly useful), we will challenge what it means to be a moral, reflective person in a commercial world that often clashes with our sensitivities and persuasions. The desired outcome of this scholarly process will be to sharpen intellectual perspectives and provide confidence, balance and realism for those challenged by the massive environmental issues facing the biotic web today.

Learning Objectives:

- Students will develop a number of the skills identified in the University of Calgary statement of learning outcomes. These include: communication, thinking, ethical reasoning, computer literacy, information retrieval, and group effectiveness.
- The assigned readings, lecture material and methodology within the course should develop a student's ability to think critically (i.e. judge, reflect, and analyze); web notes will further provide dissemination of information and enhance computer skills; preparation for examinations should foster the development of information retrieval and writing competency.
- It is important to remember that the attainment of any learning endeavour requires that students **regularly attend lectures** and participate in discussions, read the required material, and complete all course work.
