You <u>must</u> document not only direct quotations, but also paraphrases and ideas *where they appear in your text*. A reference list at the end is insufficient by itself. Readers must be able to tell exactly where your words and ideas end & other people's words & ideas begin. *Please consult your instructor or the Writing Centre (SS 110) if you have any questions regarding proper documentation of sources*.
