Description: In this course, we will study the Indian epic the *Mahabharata*. We will begin by reading a condensed version of the epic and watching the film. The rest of the course will consist of student presentations. Students will present discussion papers to the class, make available relevant resource material ahead of time (including more extensive English translations of the passages under consideration), and run the discussion. Discussion papers can focus on any literary, philosophical, sociological, psychological, political, historical, etc. topic the presenting student finds interesting. I will model this during the third week of class. (My topic will be the value of animals in the *Mahabharata*.) Final papers can (and probably should) be based on in-class presentations.
