Course Description

A critical and inter-disciplinary examination, via classic texts, of the Greco-Roman and Judaeo-Christian Heritage of Western Civilization. Focus will be on major ideas, principles, and their implications within the time-frame of the Ancient and Medieval periods (i.e., 3000 B.C. - 1350 C.E.) and in comparison with non-Western traditions.

Objectives of the Course

- Develop a familiarity with the foibles of the human condition as captured by classic texts and narratives from all over the world.
- Construct a foundation for meaningful comparisons of human experience between cultures.
- Build and modulate communication skills in a complementary fashion through a variety of exercises.

Textbooks and Readings

The following two texts are available at the U of C bookstore, and through other booksellers:

- A Loeb Classical Library Reader, Harvard University Press, 2006.
- Campbell, Joseph, Oriental Mythology: Masks of God v. II, Penguin, 1991.

Other selected readings will be assigned via D2L.

Assignments and Evaluation

Students will be evaluated through a mid-term and (Registrar-scheduled) final examination and through three written assignments to be completed during tutorial sessions.

The exams will be multiple choice and based on content from lecture and assigned readings, and each will be worth 35% of the final grade. These are closed-book examinations, but we will spend a significant amount of time in Tutorial sessions discussing likely questions and preparing for the exams.

The three Tutorial assignments will be in-class written responses of 2-3 pages (500-750 words), each worth 10% of the final grade. They are designed to build understanding of concepts and skills discussed in assigned readings. The question/subject for the response will be distributed one week prior to the writing date. Students are expected to reference both lecture and assigned readings in their response to the question. Students may bring reference materials in for support with the response, but must write the actual response during class time. Please note that in-class assignments cannot be 'made up' at a later date. Details are as follows:

Plagiarism

Using any source whatsoever without clearly documenting it is a serious academic offense. Consequences include failure on the assignment, failure in the course and possibly suspension or expulsion from the university.

You must document not only direct quotations but also paraphrases and ideas where they appear in your text. A reference list at the end is insufficient by itself. In-text citations must be provided, and readers must be able to tell exactly where your words and ideas end and other people's words and ideas begin. Wording taken directly from a source must be enclosed within quotation marks (or, for long quotations, presented in the format prescribed by the documentation style you are using). Paraphrased information must not follow the original wording and sentence structure with only slight

word substitutions here and there. These requirements apply to all assignments and sources, including those in non-traditional formats such as Web pages or visual media.
