Course Description

This course will examine some of the major works of the French New Wave, including films by Godard, Truffaut, Resnais and Varda. The movement will be considered in light of film style, historical and industrial contexts, and contemporaneous issues in film criticism. No knowledge of French is required.

Additional Information

Attendance at both lectures and screenings are essential components of this course. Students must come to class prepared to discuss the films and required reading.

Objectives of the Course

The objectives of this course are to:

- a) provide an overview of French New Wave movement;
- b) identify and analyze key films, filmmakers, and critical contexts of the French New Wave:
- c) develop written skills in the stylistic, cultural and critical analysis of films.

Assignments and Evaluation

Class Participation (ongoing)

10%

In-class discussion is an essential component of the course. You must come to class prepared to discuss the readings and screenings. Class participation grades will be evaluated based on the quality of your contributions to in-class discussions.

Test (Feb. 11) 10%

Covers the first four weeks of course material (lectures, screenings, reading). The format will include short answer and essay questions.

Essay Proposal/Annotated Bibliography (Due in class March 18) 10% 3-4 pages, total, which includes a brief (300 words) description of your topic and argument, which outlines the shape your essay will take; AND a 2-3 page annotated bibliography that lists the primary and scholarly sources that you will use and provides a brief (2-3 sentence paragraph) explanation of the relevance of each.

Research Essay (Due in class April 8)

35%

7-8 pages (not including notes/bibliography). A research essay that examines a particular film (or films) in relation to a specific concept(s) or issue(s) from the course readings/lectures, and with support from primary/scholarly literature. A list of possible topics/questions, along with more detailed instructions will be provided in Week 7.

Final Exam (Scheduled by Registrar)

35%

The final exam will cover lectures, readings, and screenings from the entire semester. The exam format will include a mix of short answer, definition, and essay questions.

All assignments and exams must be completed or a course grade of F may be assigned at the discretion of the instructor.

Submission of Assignments: Please hand in your essays directly to your instructor if possible. Assignments will be removed the following morning, stamped with the previous day's date, and placed in the instructor's mailbox.

Plagiarism

Using any source whatsoever without clearly documenting it is a serious academic offense. Consequences include failure on the assignment, failure in the course and possibly suspension or expulsion from the university.

You must document not only direct quotations but also paraphrases and ideas where they appear in your text. A reference list at the end is insufficient by itself. In-text citations must be provided, and readers must be able to tell exactly where your words and ideas end and other people's words and ideas begin. Wording taken directly from a source must be enclosed within quotation marks (or, for long quotations, presented in the format prescribed by the documentation style you are using). Paraphrased information must not follow the original wording and sentence structure with only slight word substitutions here and there. These requirements apply to all assignments and sources, including those in non-traditional formats such as Web pages or visual media.
