Course Description

This course examines film genre through its focus on the popular but often ill-defined category of "fantasy film." It will examine related terms and concepts like the numinous, the marvelous and the weird.

Objectives of the Course

The student will learn specific skills related to the study and genre, with fantasy as case study.

Assignments and Evaluation

25% Assignment One

Provide a reading of **one** of either *The Wizard of Oz, The Prestige, Excalibur* or *Pan's Labyrinth* through one of the following theoretical approaches: the numinous, Weber's disenchantment, or Todorov's fantastic/marvelous/uncanny. The student will be evaluated on their understanding of the theory and the ability to apply it perceptively and insightfully to a chosen text. You may wish to use the film to demonstrate the limitations of a given theoretical approach.

Length: 4-5 full pages. Please read the style guide provided on Desire2Learn and follow it fully. No essay that does not cite from at least one of our readings will pass.

Due: October 14

35% Assignment Two

Choose **one** of the following options:

Position Paper: Using at least one of our screenings as an example, interrogate the relationship between the three generic traditions known as science fiction, fantasy and horror. Is maintaining the lines between these three genres clear and useful, or should we think of them all as a differing strands of a single genre? Students will be judged on their ability to articulate a clear, critically informed perspective.

Research Paper: Pick a fantasy media franchise based around a secondary world and analyze it from either the perspective of world building (demonstrating how its creators have practiced subcreation of the type described the Wolf) or fandoms (how the fictional world serves its fans in the ways that Jenkins and Saler describe), or both.

Length: 5-6 full pages. Please read the style guide provided on Desire2Learn and follow it fully. No essay that does not cite from at least two of our readings will pass.

30% Final Exam

10% Participation Mark

Students are expected to both attend both lectures and labs and participate in classroom discussion. Marks will be assigned determined by the quality and volume of participation. A student who attends regularly but does not participate in classroom discussion can expect no more than 5/10.

Plagiarism

Wording taken directly from a source must be enclosed within quotation marks (or, for long quotations, presented in the format prescribed by the documentation style you are using). Paraphrased information must not follow the original wording and sentence structure with only slight word substitutions here and there. These requirements apply to all assignments and sources, including those in non-traditional formats such as Web pages or visual media.
