Course Description:

What is the “Thucydides Trap” that appears in headlines these days and who was Thucydides. CNN recently quoted a British diplomat for saying "In Aleppo, Russia and the Syrian regime seek to make a desert and call it peace." He didn't come up with that striking picture himself. He was quoting Tacitus a Roman historian who said: They make a desolation and they call it peace. Finally, a headline in the Washington Post: “A Cicero worthy of the Founding Fathers”. Marcus Tullius Cicero was a Roman statesman so what is he doing here with the Founding Fathers. The article is about John McCain and his insistence on not giving up his ideals even in difficult times. He shares that characteristic with Cicero who opposed Mark Anthony well knowing that it was a hopeless cause.

With this course, you will be able to answer these questions. The course is a lecture course that covers the history and culture of Ancient Greece and Rome from the prehistoric Minoan

civilisation on Crete in the 2nd millennium BC to the Christian Roman Empire under emperor Constantine in the early 4th century AD.

Please note that the textbook readings are supposed to give you a background for each lecture topic. I will not repeat what your textbook already has said. Therefore, please do read the assigned text before class. A more detailed syllabus will be distributed in class.

Slides and additional information will be posted on D2L but you shouldn't see this as a substitute for lecture notes at all.

As you will see below that are many quizzes/midterms and they are all multiple choice. When there are so many your chances of obtaining a final good grade increases considerably if you should do badly in one quiz. So, don't worry over that.

Core Competencies: Civilisation was not invented in Ancient Greece and Rome but these two cultures are the ones that have influenced the western world. Students will learn about the world we live in by an increased knowledge of Greece and Rome where the norms and ideas on which we build our society were formed.
