COURSE CALENDAR STATEMENT:

Early Greece from the late Bronze Age to the Persian Wars.

COURSE DESCRIPTION:

This course focus on key elements of the development of Ancient Greeks from the Bronze Age to the Persian Wars (e.g. social structure, political thinking, etc.) and tries to shine a light on their importance for the following periods and for the birth of Greek democracy. Students will engage with sources, including – but not limited to – ancient texts and will be exposed to some of the important disagreements that can be found in scholarly research. Through class discussions, critical reading and assignments, the students will be encouraged to reflect on such elements and to formulate their own opinion.

COURSE LEARNING OUTCOMES

Upon successful completion of this course, students will be able to:

- 1. Understand the development of societies in Greece from the Bronze Age to the Persian Wars
- 2. Identify and analyze key historical texts from Early Greece
- 3. Use critical thinking toward theories concerning Early Greece
- 4. Reflect on the lessons that can be learned from the past and use modern world to identify patterns
- 5. Engage with different tools used by historians to understand ancient history

LEARNING RESOURCES

No textbook will be required for this course. However, weekly readings or web links, including peer-reviewed articles and ancient sources, are posed on D2L.

EXAMINATIONS

Primary source analysis (20%): Students will be assigned a passage from an ancient author. They will contextualize the passage, identify key elements in the passage, and provide explanations and/or comments regarding those elements. The marking sheet and criteria for assessment are posted in D2L.

Aligned Course Learning Outcomes: 1, 2 and 5

Midterm (25%): Students will be asked short and middle length development questions regarding the material covered from week 1 to 3.

Aligned Course Learning Outcomes: 1, 2, 3, 4 and 5

Articles review (20%): Student will be assigned two scholarly articles presenting opposite views on a same subject covered in class. They will summarize and explain the views of both authors. They will also take position on the matter and provide justification for their position by using knowledge learned in class and in the readings. The marking sheet and criteria for assessment are posted in D2L.

Aligned Course Learning Outcomes: 1, 3 and 5

Reflection (10%): Following the discussions during the last class (week 7), the student will be asked in class to write a short personal reflection about the lessons that can be learned from ancient Greece (politics, society, role of literature, etc.). They will be encouraged to establish links or comparisons with modern time or any other time period that seem fitting.

Aligned Course Learning Outcomes: 1, 3 and 4

Final exam (25%): Students will answer short and middle length development questions regarding the material covered from week 4 to 7. They will also answer one long development question covering matters explored through the whole course.

MISSED OR LATE ASSIGNMENTS

If students miss an evaluation or a deadline for an assignment, they must contact the instructor by email within 24 hours to discuss options to submit and/or make-up for it. Assignments submitted after the deadline may be penalized with the loss of a grade (e.g.: A to A-) for each day late.

EXPECTATIONS FOR WRITING

All written assignments will be assessed partly on writing skills. This includes surface correctness (grammar, punctuation, sentence structure, etc.) but also general clarity and organization. Students will be encouraged to formulate personal opinions. While doing so, it is expected from them to use knowledge from modern and ancient sources to sustain their opinion.
