There are numerous editions of the works that we will be reading. The list below indicates the suggested version of these texts (or books that offer useful collections of authors or texts) but most versions will suffice. More details will be provided in class.

- Homer, *The Iliad*, trans. Richmond Lattimore (Chicago, 2011)
- T. Sargent, *The Homeric Hymns* (W. W. Norton & Company, 1975) A translated collection of the *Homeric Hymns*
- M. L. West, *Greek Lyric Poetry* (Oxford World Classics) A translated collection of numerous Greek poets
- Aeschylus, *The Oresteia: Agamemnon*, The *Libation Bearers*, and The *Eumenides* (*Aeschylus I, The Complete Greek Tragedies*, ed. Grene and Lattimore)
- Sophocles, *Oedipus the King, Oedipus at Colonus, Antigone* (*Sophocles I, The Complete Greek Tragedies*, ed. Grene and Lattimore)
- Euripides, *Bacchae*, *Medea* (Penguin Classics)
- Aristophanes, Lysistrata (Penguin Classics)

Course Objectives

This course provides an introduction to Greek poetry and drama. It aims to familiarize the student with numerous authors and texts, as well as to equip the student with the necessary skills to approach Greek literature in translation with confidence.

Requirements

1. Class Participation: two factual quizzes (2 @ 20%) 40% Quizzes will cover the factual details of the texts (i.e. author, plot, context) and require a thorough understanding of the works.

2. Essay Project: 50%

Essay Outline (25%): An outline of the final essay with an annotated bibliography Final Essay (25%): 2500 word research essay. Questions will be distributed.

3. Reading Journal: 10%

To be submitted at the end of term. Additional details will be provided.
