Texts: There are no assigned textbooks for this course. In the first week of classes we will distribute the

beginning of a list of readings available in the University Library or on the internet; expansion of

this list will be part of the course requirements.

Assignments:

- 1. **Bibliographies** [10%]. Each student will do a short survey of some bibliographic sources early in the term, to familiarize you with modern scholarship in the field. You will also be required to submit a briefly annotated bibliography for you essay topic at the same time as you present your first seminar.
- 2. Five brief, biweekly **reports** [25%] on topics assigned every other Thursday, and due the following Tuesday. These are in lieu of tests.
- 3. A **terminal project** [25%] of about 2,500 words, on a topic chosen early in the term in consultation with the instructors. These are due no later than Monday 13 December 2010.
- 4. Two oral **seminars**, the first a 15-minute introduction to your project topic [10%], the second a 30-minute presentation of the material in your penultimate draft of the project [15%]. We encourage you to use Powerpoint to illustrate the physical evidence, and to speak without a prepared text.
- 5. Active participation in class discussions during both lectures and student seminars [15%].
- 6. There will be **no final examination** in this course.

Notes:

- 1. Because we do not post our complete lectures on Blackboard, attendance at class is an essential element of the course. This also gives you the opportunity to ask questions and discuss the material, which we hope you will do regularly.
- 2. We encourage you to maintain consultation with us throughout the term, to ask for help when you are floundering or confused, to discuss difficulties with your seminars and project, and to keep us aware of unexpected absences.
- 3. Note that you will not be eligible for a passing grade unless you complete **all** assignments
- 4. The withdrawal deadline for this course is Friday 10 December 2010. You can track your current standing in the course through Blackboard. The last day to withdraw from this course with a refund of fees is Friday 24 September 2010.
- 5.
