Required Text(s): Books will be put on hold in the library's reserve collections and articles and ebooks will be available online through the University website.

Course Description: This course will explore the origins and development of ancient Greek biography diachronically from a number of angles: the relation between biography and history; the relationship between fiction and biography; the development of autobiography; the influence of philosophical schools on the genre; the role of ethics; the ancient concept of character.

Online elements for this course: Some course readings will be available online.

Core Competencies: Students will work on the following skills: contextualisation of historic texts; critical appraisal of primary and secondary material; practical application of theories and concepts presented in course readings and lectures; and clear expression of ideas in both written assignments and oral presentations.
