COURSE CALENDAR STATEMENT:

This course completes the study of basic grammar, vocabulary, and translation skills.

COURSE DESCRIPTION:

This course uses an accelerated approach to familiarize students with more complex grammar, and then proceeds to focus on skills for reading Latin texts. Students will learn and practise new grammatical concepts in class, and apply them in weekly assignments. New vocabulary will be introduced, but will not be the subject of direct evaluation. The last part of the course will feature some flexibility, as students will have the opportunity to apply their grasp of Latin grammar in the translation and analysis of Latin texts (some assigned, and some chosen by the students).

COURSE LEARNING OUTCOMES

Upon successful completion of this course, students will be able to:

1. Demonstrate mastery of the concepts covered in chapters 23 to 40 of the textbook.
2. Demonstrate techniques for reading, translating, and analysing Latin texts.
3. Demonstrate an improved grasp on English grammar and vocabulary.
4. Appreciate an increased affinity for the Romance languages (*e.g.*, French, Italian, Spanish).
5. Apply several techniques for the analysis of a language's structure.
6. Articulate some awareness of the connections between language, culture, and history.

ASSESSMENT COMPONENTS

Weekly assignments (20%): Students will complete and submit small exercises and assignments throughout the term. These exercises are designed to ensure comprehension of the new grammar covered, and will most frequently require analysis and composition of Latin sentences. The intention is for the students to receive individualized feedback in a timely fashion. These exercises will only be evaluated for completeness, not correctness. [Aligned Course Learning Outcomes: 1, 2]

In-class Preparedness and Participation (10%): Students will be expected to attend class having already completed the assigned tasks, and to be prepared to participate in discussion of the material. Prepared participation might include answering questions when asked, asking questions, or otherwise demonstrating engagement with the course material. Correctness is less important than engagement. This component of the course will be evaluated weekly. [Aligned Course Learning Outcomes: 1, 2, 3, 4, 5, 6]

Term Assignments (3 x 15% = 45%): These three take-home assignments will test students' comprehension of the Latin learned to date. They will include exercises in translation, composition, and analysis. While the focus will be on concepts learned since the previous assignment, each

assignment will expect mastery of previous material. (Thus, these assignments will get more difficult as the term progresses.) [Aligned Course Learning Objectives: 1, 2, 5]

Final Assignment (25%): A longer final assignment will test students' comprehension of all the material covered in the course and enable them to apply what they have learned to the analysis of a Latin text of their own choosing. [Aligned Course Learning Objectives: 1, 2, 5]

When the final grade for the course is calculated, the calculated numerical mark will be rounded up or down to the nearest whole number before being converted to a letter grade. It is not necessary to pass each assignment in order to pass the course.

All written assignments will be assessed at least partly on writing skills. Writing skills include not only surface correctness (grammar, punctuation, sentence structure, etc.) but also general clarity and organization. Sources must be properly documented.
