#### **Course Description:**

The old course description found in the University of Calgary Calendar reads:

Readings (in English translation) from the classical literatures of middle Eastern and Asian religions. Introduction to the evolving mythological traditions from three geo-cultural centres (the middle East, India, and China) by examining recurring themes: cosmology; existential values and goals; destinies of humans, the world, and the cosmos.

The revised course description, which will be used in this section of the course, is:

This course addresses the issue of religious and secular worldviews beginning with a discussion of the theory and practice of worldview analysis. It illustrates specific religious worldviews using translated texts from major religious traditions in the context of the history and development of world religions. Recurring themes such as narrative frameworks, cosmology; existential values, goals; the destiny of humans, the world, and the cosmos, form a focus for this discussion. This is a traditional university course that emphasizes reading and individual research by the student. It requires approximately 3 hours reading each week. Some weeks the reading will take slightly more than 3 hours, on other weeks it will be slightly less.

N.B. All written assignments will be graded with regard to both form and content.

#### Policy with regard to missed assignments/assessments:

Students must take the test on the assigned day, have a valid medical note, or prove exceptional circumstances. Late papers are accepted, but will be automatically deducted 10% per day that they are overdue. This rule also applies to anyone who requests to sit the test on a different date without a doctor's note or other external evidence of necessity; i.e., if you are allowed to write the test at a later date, the penalty will be a 10% reduction in your mark.

#### **Expectations for student conduct in this course:**

Attendance: students are expected to attend *most* lectures and sign an attendance sheet on a regular basis.

**Class etiquette**: remember you are not the only student in the class. Please make every effort to arrive on time and not to leave before the class ends. You are expected to pay attention to the lecture and not distract other students.

**MP3 Computers and other devices**: while attending class the wearing of earphones or similar devices is not permitted nor are computers to be used for watching videos or playing computer games. Cell phones must be turned off and not taken out in class for texting or any other purposes.

#### **Electronic Device Policy:**

Recent evidence shows that students who use computers in class learn significantly less than those who write their own notes. Therefore, the use of computers in class will only be allowed for students who register their use of a computer and submit their course notes to the course email address immediately following the end of each class. If you use a computer in class then failure to submit your course notes on a weekly basis will result in the loss of marks up to 25% of the final grade.

**Recording of lectures**: For copyright reasons recording any part of any lectures in any form, including through a computer, is not permitted. Nor will the power point slides or lecture notes be posted on the web for the same reason. Photographing power point lectures with a cell phone or other device is not permitted. All of these restrictions are due to copyright issues and are strictly enforced.
