## **Course Description:**

This course addresses the issue of religious and secular myths and worldviews beginning with a discussion of the theory and practice of myth and worldview analysis. It illustrates specific religious worldviews using readings translated into English from major religious traditions in the context of the history and development of world religions. Recurring themes such as narrative paradigms, cosmology; existential values, goals; the destiny of humans, the world, and the cosmos, may form a focus for this discussion.

Classes begin on Tuesday September 5 and end on Thursday December 4. The mid-term break is from Sunday November 10 to Saturday November 16. The last day to drop a class without charge is September 12. The last day to withdraw from the course is December 6.

#### Online elements for this course:

This is a blended learning course which will incorporate online materials and activities such as watching videos etc. Students will find full details of these activities in the course syllabus.

## **Core Competencies:**

- a) The ability to define terms such as "myth," "worldview," and "narrative paradigm."
- b) Develop the ability to recognize and discuss the importance of their growing use in discussions of religion and politics.
- c) Think critically about the use of terms like myth and worldviews and what they imply for society.
- d) Gain an appreciation of the importance of using different academic methods and the role of theory in academic work.
- e) Understand the historical contexts in which these terms are used in various world religions.
- f) Appreciate their importance for communicating religious beliefs and ideas
- g) Be able to make informed judgments about religious and secular myths and worldviews.

Include the subject of your email and clearly identify yourself by name and the course you are registered in. Please do not send email inquiries related to dates and deadlines. Students shall refer to the university calendar, course outline, and final exam schedule for schedule information. Inquiries related to exams or assignments must be sent no less than 24 hours before a deadline. The instructor will reply to emails on business days only.
