Course RELS 200 – Religious Myths and Worldviews (Wed-Based)

Time Electronic Online Course Through Desire2Learn

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Required Text(s): Thury, Eva and Margaret Devinney. *Introduction to Mythology: Contemporary Approaches to Classical and World Myths*. New York: Oxford University Press, 2013 (the Fourth Edition).

Course Description: This course will provide students with an introduction to the study of religious myths and worldviews by examining original texts, interpretations, and theories. This course will also provide students with an opportunity to encounter different religious myths told through various traditional stories. These myths or stories have special significance since they establish a society's basic worldviews, meaning, and values. This course will explore religious myths and worldviews through examining core concepts and traditional texts of different religious traditions from around the world.

There is a strong focus on self-directed or independent learning throughout this course since it is a web-based course. This course has been condensed for the Spring term and covers the same amount of material as a Fall or Winter semester course. Students should expect it to be a full semester worth of work in a shorter amount of time.

This course will be divided into six sections:

- 1). Introduction to Studying Myth
- 2). Creation Myths
- 3). Destruction Myths
- 4). Heroes, Tricksters, and Myth
- 5). Ritual and Myth
- 6). Mythological Themes in Modern Narratives

Online elements for this course: Students will access online lecture materials, multi-media materials, complete, and submit tests and assignments through Desire2Learn.

Core Competencies: Committed students will become familiar with important terms and concepts associated with religion and mythology. Students will be knowledgeable of essential myths in many world religions after examining a wide range of myths and primary source materials. Through actively engaging with required readings and lecture materials, students will be able to read and think critically about how narratives and myths shape religious worldviews.
