Course Description:

This course will introduce Eastern religious traditions that have been practiced in Asia, focusing on India, Tibet, China, and Japan. We will explore Hinduism, Buddhism with its development in India, Tibet, China, and Japan, and other religious traditions in China (Confucianism and Daoism) and Japan (Shinto). By studying the historical developments of each tradition and its social, political, and cultural contexts, we will attempt to understand how philosophy and religious practices have been shaped by and affected human life. The textbook will be the main source, but we will also make use of video and visual aids to explore the multiple dimensions of each tradition.

Core Competencies:

Students will learn about a variety of religious phenomena and concerns, such as philosophy, worldviews, morality, rituals, festivals, and so on. When studying Eastern religious traditions, for the sake of critical analysis, it is important at times to consciously suspend preconceived ideas derived from Western religious thought. One should try to avoid claims or views that are based on one's beliefs when interpreting the material of this course.

Format:

Quiz.

The quiz consists of 20 fill-in-the-blanks. This small quiz will assess familiarity with the important religious terms and concepts of Eastern religions.

Exams.

- 1) Exam 1 consists of two sections: 6 short answers and a short essay.
- 2) Exam 2 consists of three sections: 20 fill-in-the-blanks, 6 short answers, and a short essay.
- 2) Exam 3 consists of three sections: 10 fill-in-the-blanks, 4 short answers, and a short essay.
- 3) Exam 4 consists of two sections: 10 fill-in-the-blanks and 4 short answers.

Contents:

Fill in the blanks and short answers are designed for testing knowledge and information on class materials including textbook, class notes, video and other visual aids (photos). The short essay question requires students to demonstrate both knowledge of class materials and critical analysis.

Absence from Examinations:

The request to re-schedule exam dates will not be considered except for the following reasons: 1) severe medical condition of students or their close relatives or 2) attendance at funeral of family or relatives. In either case, the student must provide a doctor's note, a police document, a death certification, or newspaper obituary. If the student is absent from any examination other than the listed reasons, he/she will receive a 0 (zero) grade for the missed examination.
