Course Description

This course is designed to be an introduction to the spiritual traditions of India, China, and Japan. Major topics in Hinduism, Buddhism, Confucianism, Taoism, and Shinto will be presented by means of lectures, discussions, films, and readings.

Core Competencies

The student will become familiar with the important facts, authorities, schools and movements in the South and East Asian Traditions. Important cultural elements will be studied. Students will be exposed to modern scholarly methodologies. Critical analysis and interpretations of evidence will play a central role.

Course Requirements

Class participation refers to joining the discussions and submitting a "question of the day". There will be a midterm (in-class) and a **Registrar scheduled final exam**. Marks are given on a scale with a total of 100 points. Reading assignments will be given out in class.

*** Students must take tests on the assigned day and time or have a valid medical note. Final exams will not be returned to students.
