Objectives

The primary course objective is for students to develop an understanding of the nature of religion, generally, and of the religion of ancient Israel in particular. In RELS 301 students read literature from and about the Hebrew Bible. All study is done in English translation (New Revised Standard Version English translation, *The HarperCollins Study Bible*).

Secondary objectives arising from learning activities; development of:

- 1. reading and analytical skills arising from close readings of assigned readings (inclass as well as pre-class preparation)
- 2. skills in contributing to group discussion and advancing thought about a common focus (in class and in Blackboard virtual discussions)
- 3. writing (organization and development of an argument; efficient editing strategies; critical penetration skills) and thinking skills arising from group discussion

Weekly class activities

- 1. reading and reflecting on the assigned readings (preparation, prior to class, and in class)
- 2. group discussion of the readings (in class and in Blackboard virtual discussions)
- 3. written responses to set questions arising from the assigned readings (in class and in blackboard virtual discussions)

Assessment

- (30%) in-class discussion participation (active learning [20%] and attendance [10%]); assessed weekly. Discussions are aimed at advancing collaborative learning about course topics.
- 2. (35%) focused written critical reflections arising from the assigned weekly readings. Following the in-class discussion or a reading or lecture presentation students will write a brief focused response to one or two set questions.

3. (35%) written contributions to the Blackboard discussion forums. Discussions are aimed at advancing collaborative learning about course topics. Participation in online discussions requires two actions each week:

a) a response to one of the posted discussion questions; b) a follow-up response in a discussion thread. Perfunctory follow-ups such as "I agree" or "ditto" do not move understanding forward and so cannot augment the forum participation grade. Examples of acceptable participation:

- 1. expressing opinions or observations. These should be offered in some depth and should be supported by evidence arising from posted course materials.
- 2. making a connection between a current and prior discussion questions or posted course materials.
- 3. commenting on a prior point in the weekly discussion thread
- 4. synthesizing prior points and adding a question or point that advances the understanding evolving in the discussion thread.

*There will be no Registrar scheduled final exam for this course.
