Content and Objectives:

What is suffering? Why do humans view it negatively? How do humans transform prolonged pain into experiences with meaning and purpose? This course will address these questions as we explore and analyze selected representations of human suffering. In so doing, we will situation human experience and representation within the context of 3.8 billion years of earth-bound biology. We will also turn to the future to explore the transhumanist promise of extended painfree existence.

Assessments:

Tests - 50%

Three non-cumulative, equally weighted tests comprised of short-answer questions, the first two tests to be written in class on January 28, March 4, and the third test to be written as a take-home test on March 25 (due Monday, March 28.)

Quiz - 10%

One quiz to be written on April 13.

Representational Analysis - 30%

For this analytical component, students will have the choice of either writing a 8-10 page essay that compares three representations of suffering, or of exercising their creative imaginations by representing an instance of suffering of importance to the student, using any non-essay medium. Further information and details on these two analysis options will be given early in the term. The deadline for the submission of this component of the course is March 30.

Participation (10%)

Student participation is the privilege of a class-based university experience. To promote this privilege, students in this course will be graded for their engagement with the materials presented and the readings assigned. Use of electronic devices (including laptops), failure to "attend" to the lectures and/or the course, or speaking simply for the appearance of participation will have a negative effect on a student's participation grade. Why? Because a humanities course studies the most profound subject ever to be studied: the human being. Failure to attend to other humans and their work is not simply inconsiderate, it is inhuman and dehumanizing. It is also anathema to a humanities education.
