Religion and Social Morality

Textbooks: By the Grace of Guile: The Role of Deception in Natural History and Human Affairs (Loyal Rue).

Description and Objectives: This course is an oddity, perplexing even to instructors in the Religious Studies program. Nevertheless, we will soldier on, defining social morality as a game whose rules are rooted in human rather than heavenly realms. On the whole, this course be a light-hearted exploration of the subject. We will dabble in key concepts of the discourse of morality and will search high-and-low for the presence of *deception* within social systems. At times the course will turn heavy, lending academic heft to our engagements as we turn thought to some prominent social theorists, many of whom will have us wondering how on earth our problematic world works as well as it does. The material for our discussions will be drawn widely, from the animal world to our own classroom, from global scenarios to local situations, with frequent assessments of that most odd and deceptive of human inventions, religion.
