RELS 353.01 *Islam in the Modern World*

Textbooks: *What Went Wrong?* (Bernard Lewis); *The Clash of Modernities* (Kahldoun Samman); *Islam in Transition* (Donohue/Esposito, eds).

Content and Objectives:

A common feature of any academic presentation of a world religion is the profound impact that European modernity has exercised on the thought and behaviour of that religion's adherents. Nowhere is this feature more prevalent than in academic discussions of Islam, which frequently mention the term "clash." Whether this clash involves civilizations (Bernard Lewis), cultures or interests (Fawaz Gerges), fundamentalisms (Tariq Ali), or modernities (Kahldoun Samman), all such constructions set up a metaphorical collision between two non-material entities (Islam versus modernity, or West versus East). This course will explore the ways that Muslims have engaged with modernity by analyzing a diversity of voices ranging from academic scholars to non-academic activists and from Muslims to non-Muslims. The outcomes of this exploration will be: 1) an awareness of academic modes of operation, 2) an introductory familiarity with the theory of dialogic and the method of discourse analysis, and 3) an understanding of human beings and their deeply motivated struggles.

Assessments:

Four Quizzes – 30% (Jan 3, 4, 6, and 7)

Non-cumulative and equally-weighted, using a variety of assessment styles from multiple choice to short-answer, to be written at 9:00 am every morning except the first day. These quizzes will test the student's knowledge of the assigned readings, lecture presentations, and discussions from the previous day.

Four Group Presentations – 30%

Students will be assigned each to a group and each group will be assigned a specific voice which it must (re)present during the afternoon discussion periods (excluding the first day).

One Essay – 40% (due Friday, January 31)

A 4-5 page essay that utilizes Samman, Lewis, and one other voice (featured during the block-week) to analyze academically a contemporary representation of modern Islam, whether it be a news report, a film or movie, a novel, a textbook, a journal article, blog posting, or some other medium.

Student Expectations:

Obviously, given the time compression involved, a block week course demands full attendance from a student. Attendance is therefore vital if a student wishes to achieve a strong performance. Absence from a test or from a group discussion will result in an automatic failing grade. *All quizzes must be written on the date and time stipulated.* Should an illness or family emergency arise that necessitates more than one day of absence, withdrawal from the course is recommended. Late essay submissions will be penalized 5%/day, including weekends. Significant “acts of God” (i.e. a winter blizzard) will be dealt with extemporaneously.

If possible, it is recommended that students read the Samman and Lewis textbooks in advance of January 2. Furthermore, students are advised to:

- *enter* in their personal calendar all deadlines pertinent to the assessments of this course (see schedule in Blackboard);
- *read* the assigned readings (a schedule will be posted in Blackboard, Course Information) prior to the week's lectures;
- *ask* questions of clarification related to the assigned readings (in class [if time] or via email);
- *attend* the lectures and record detailed notes;
- *review* and *reflect* on lecture notes. Obtain information from a classmate where records are inadequate; confirm or gain understanding of difficult concepts from the instructor;
- *check* email messages and Blackboard postings for updates and announcements;
- *study* hard and smart, allotting sufficient time prior to each test for rereading of textbook and notes.
