Comparative Studies in Western Religions – Religion and Violence

Textbook: *Princeton Readings in Religion and Violence* (eds. Jurgensmeyer and Kitts; Princeton University Press 2011; 228 pages) *Violence* (Slavoj Zizek; Picador 2008).

Description and Objectives:

Clouds of violence have threatened populations for millennia and, given recent global events, appear forecast to extend their holy terror well into the future. This course will sample original sources (from ancient texts to writings of modern-day suicide bombers) to demonstrate the complex relationship between violence and religion. The course will also employ such theorists as Durkheim, Girard, Freud, and Bataille to analyze violence within religion (i.e., ritual sacrifice) and violence in the name of religion (e.g., Sept 9/11). Each Thursday will feature student-led discussions of Zizek's provocative book on systemic violence in contemporary society.

Course Assessments:

The assessments in this course are focused on the development of two principal academic skills: written analysis and engaged discussion.

Analytical Responses (60%)

Students will demonstrate and develop their skills of writing and analysis in six, equally-weighted responses to lecture presentations and discussions related to the Princeton Readings textbook. These responses ought to be thoughtful and succinct, to be submitted electronically by midnight on the following dates: Sept 25, Oct 9, Oct 23, Nov 6, Nov 20, and Dec 4.

Discursive Engagements (40%)

On Thursdays, students will take turns in leading a class discussion on the assigned readings for the day. Those leading the discussion will be graded on their ability to lead discussion and on their demonstration of knowledge of the readings. The remainder of the class will also be graded on their willingness to engage in thoughtful, informed discussion of the readings. The marks for each Thursday's discussion will be posted in D2L.

Participation Bonus (10%)

Additionally, students will have the opportunity to gain a bonus of up to 10% by engaging with the instructor on materials presented in the Tuesday lectures. This bonus will be applied at the end of term, once all other assessments have been completed.
