Course Overview:

This course will investigate historical and contemporary issues regarding Western appropriations of Eastern religious traditions and philosophies, and manifestations within Western culture. Our approach will emphasize four general frames of reference to situate our topic: 1) History 2) Critical Theory 3) Art and Literature 4) Comparative Philosophy. At the outset, we will study the crucial history of the "discovery" of Eastern religions (through 19th Century interpretations) and its definitive relationship to the formation of religious studies as a secular university discipline. We will then investigate the theoretical issues that arise when dealing with problems of cultural appropriations or what Said famously calls "Orientalism" as well as subsequent theories that develop out of, and allow us to re-think, Said's work. With the theoretical foundations of the course established, we will consider specific examples of philosophical and literary appropriations with an explicit emphasis on Buddhist, Daoist, and Hindu figurations in the West.

Core Competencies

This course will enable us to: 1) develop skills necessary for close textual readings and analysis of relevant materials 2) develop sensitivities and awareness of cross-cultural issues and begin to think through the philosophical and ethical questions concerning cultural appropriations 3) display adequate understanding of the intellectual histories of the West that help shape the reception of Eastern religious-philosophies 4) develop improved writing skills to better articulate the data/questions/issues extracted from course readings and discussions.
