Course Description

Why does the hitman Jules repeatedly deliver a diatribe from the prophet Ezekiel in *Pulp Fiction*? What does *The Truman Show* have to do with Adam and Eve or *The Prestige* with Jesus? And why do so many moderns relish an escape into the virtual realities of film, yet also—even within the same day—escape into ancient biblical worlds? In comparing the Bible with modern cinematography, students will apply a variety of academic frameworks to analyze human engagements with framed realities. Of particular importance will be the primary themes of academic interest when studying religion: mythology, scripturality, suspension of disbelief, iconography, and ideology. As the course unfolds, students will explore the tendency to scripturalize virtual productions, a process that transforms virtual constructions into cognitive maps which enable humans to persevere in an environment which is often confused and hostile.

This course follows the academic mandate set out by Bruce Lincoln:

When one permits those whom one studies to define the terms in which they will be understood, suspends one's interest in the temporal and contingent, or fails to distinguish between 'truths,' 'truth-claims,' and 'regimes of truth,' one has ceased to function as a historian or scholar. In that moment, a variety of roles are available: some perfectly capable (amanuensis, collector, friend and advocate) and some less appealing (cheerleader, voyeur, retailer of import goods). None, however should be confused with scholarship. ("Theses on Method," Method and Theory in the Study of Religion 8, 225-7; 1996)

These critical papers will involve a combination of group-work and individual effort. Students will view each film in preassigned viewing groups—following each viewing the groups will discuss the film *from the critical perspective associated with each particular film*. Then each student will write and submit a <u>maximum</u> one-page, double-spaced paper containing two parts: a few comments on the viewing experiences of the group (25%), and an insightful discussion of the film and its relationship to the Bible (75%). While each paper will be assessed as an individual product, the better the group discussion, the better the individual paper.
