Content and Objectives:

Truman and Adam share a great escape while trapped renegade priests battle the 18th century Roman Catholic Church. Audiences gasp as placid heroes unsheathe swords, then laugh as gun-toting thugs debate divine miracles. Magicians stage prestigious resurrections, the Logos slips into a computer, and DiCaprio plumbs the depths of Plato's Cave. Students of this course will academically engage multiple adventures in(to) cinematic and biblical worlds and in doing so, will come to understand the human ability to transform experiences of the unreal into fresh perceptions of the real. In comparing modern films and ancient (biblical) texts, students will also develop an academic understanding of the impact that mental assumptions have on one's perception of reality, a postmodern retake of Isaiah's "*he sees many things, but does not observe them; his ears are open, but he does not hear*" (42:20).

This course will adopt as its primary objective and mode the following statement:

When one permits those whom one studies to define the terms in which they will be understood, suspends one's interest in the temporal and contingent, or fails to distinguish between 'truths,' 'truth-claims,' and 'regimes of truth,' one has ceased to function as a historian or scholar. In that moment, a variety of roles are available: some perfectly capable (amanuensis, collector, friend and advocate) and some less appealing (cheerleader, voyeur, retailer of import goods). None however should be confused with scholarship. (Bruce Lincoln "Theses on Method," Method and Theory in the Study of Religion 8, 225-7; 1996)

Assessments:

Five Tests - 50%

Non-cumulative and equally-weighted, using a variety of assessment styles from multiple choice to short-answer. These tests will be written in the first hour of class, on the following dates: Jan 31, Feb 14, Mar 7, Mar 21, and Apr 4.

Analytical Viewer Journal - 50%

Every two weeks, students will record in an *Analytical Viewer Journal* their experiences of the six hermeneutical lenses used in this course. Each entry will focus on three levels of experience: 1) classroom viewing of the films; 2) reading of assigned Bible passages; and 3) engagement with real life. These journal records will be brief, concise, and analytical, with approximately 150 words devoted to each of the three experiential levels (maximum length for each journal entry: 500 words total). The completed journals must be submitted electronically into Blackboard's Digital Dropbox by noon on April 15.

Participation Bonus - 10% per test

A reward for good viewing protocol--see first item of "Details" (below).

*There will be no Registrar scheduled Final Exam for this course.

Student Responsibilities:

To ensure a successful learning experience in this course, students are advised to:

- *read* the assigned readings (see schedule posted in Blackboard, Course Information) prior to the week's lecture;
- *ask* questions of clarification related to the assigned readings (in class [if time] or via email);
- *attend* the lectures and record detailed notes;
- *engage* the film viewings, mindful of: 1) the filmic presentation, 2) the prescribed hermeneutical lens (presented in the preceding week's lecture), and 3) the collective "mood" of the viewing audience (the latter is important for the *Analytical Viewing Journal* assignment);
- *review* and *reflect* on lecture notes. Obtain information from a classmate where records are inadequate; confirm or gain understanding of difficult concepts from the instructor;
- *study* hard and smart, allotting sufficient time prior to each test for rereading of textbook and notes.

Details:

Please note these important information details:

- students who arrive to a film viewing late or who wish to access computers, cellphones etc. during the viewing must take a seat at the back of the class where they will not disturb other viewers. Those who adopt an "ideal viewer" position will remain near the front; these students will receive a bonus mark of 10% on the following test.
- no remedial assignments are available in this course.
- lecture notes will not be available from the instructor.
- a passing grade on any of the graded components is not essential for passing the course.
- exams must be written on the dates scheduled. No exceptions will be made, except for death, significant illness, or domestic affliction (corroborated by a valid, original note

from a physician or counselor). You must contact the instructor within twenty-four hours of a missed exam or deadline. The University Calendar states:

"It is the responsibility of students who have prolonged absences from class because of physical and/or emotional health problems to present to the faculty office offering the course a statement from a physician/counselor attesting to the physical or emotional health of the student."
