Objectives of the Course:

This seminar will introduce students to the study of new religious movements with a particular emphasis on research methods and theories used to understand them. It involves a weekly seminar discussion of assigned texts.

Course competencies

At the end of this course students ought to be able to:

- a) use a variety of methods for the study of new religious and religious movements;
- b) discuss various theoretical explanations for the rise of religious movements;
- c) think critically about the appropriate way to study new religions;
- d) appreciate the importance of using correct academic methods intelligently;
- e) be able to make informed judgments about the reliability of specific books and texts.

Course Details:

The course will proceed as a senior seminar in which participants will present papers and book reviews on different aspects of the study of new religions and religious movements and discuss various theories for the interpretation of such groups. Members of the seminar are expected to participate in the weekly discussions.

COURSE REQUIREMENTS

- 1) Write an academic paper of 3,000 words and discuss in class an agreed topic relating to one of the methods used in the study of new religious movements. The date of the presentation/discussion will be arranged in class. Paper worth 40% of the final grade. The final paper is due on Thursday 8 December.
- 2) Lead a class discussion of an issue in the study of NRMs presentation/discussion worth 10% of the final grade.
- 3) Write an academic style and a dictionary style article of 1,500 words on an aspect of the study of new religious movements. Worth 20% of the final grade. Due Thursday 20 October
- 4) Write a short book review of 1,500 words evaluating two of the assigned textbooks. Worth 20% of the final grade. Due Thursday 10 November.
- 5) Attendance and participation worth 10% of the final grade.

*There will be no Registrar scheduled Final Exam for this course.
