## **Course Description:**

This is an upper-level undergraduate seminar concerned with the nature and role of mystical experiences in a comparative religious context. The seminar will focus on three central questions, inherent in the course title: namely what is mystical experience and how are we to analyse it?; how can religious experience be compared if at all?; and how should we understand the notion of a religious tradition and what role does mysticism play in this idea? Course topics may include esoteric and exoteric epistemologies, the essentialist/constructivist debate, religious experience as grounds for interreligious dialogue, apophatic traditions and the neurological basis/correlate of mystical experience.

#### **Core Competencies:**

Committed students in this class will have the opportunity to reflect on central issues in the comparative study of mystical traditions in western and eastern religious traditions and gain an appreciation for both the similarity and diversity of mystical writings. Additionally, students will develop their written and oral communication skills as well as their analytic and critical abilities. As this is an upper level undergraduate course, some ability to construct clear, cogent and concise arguments will be assumed while allowing that these will be sharpened through the course. The ability to critically reflect on one's own and other's presuppositions will be a key skill to be further developed in this course.
