Course Description:

On Translation:

Translation is not only a key issue in the study of religion, but also a central process in all cognition. Translating information between domains brings to light epistemological, hermeneutic and even moral issues which strike at the heart of the construction of 'religion' and ourselves as students/participants of religions. This course will consider some of the current research on translation focusing particularly on its theorisation in religious studies. The course will take the form of individual supervisions between students and their supervisors punctuating independent research, culminating in departmental colloquia.

Core Competencies:

Committed students to this course will gain an understanding of the role, structure and theories of translation in both religious and other literature and expression. They will gain in their abilities to synthesise materials and present arguments concerning translation in both oral and written formats. Students will gain an awareness of the current level of debate and discussion regarding translation in religious studies and its potential use in cross-cultural discourses.
