Course Description

This course will view the Moghul Empire as the background for the introduction of European powers to S. Asia. The course will then focus on the society, resources and environment; cultural diversities; philosophic and religious traditions; arts and aesthetics; historical bases of modernity; role of education in social development; ideological differences and economic development of India.

Objectives of the Course

The student will be introduced to multidimensional aspects of South Asian culture, key terms, important facts, authorities, movements and foundational ideas that have shaped this region in early modern and modern times. Students will be exposed to modern scholarly methodologies. Critical analysis and interpretations of evidence will play a central role.
