Course Description

An introduction to the basic principles of rhetorical theory, criticism and practice. Students will learn rhetorical perspectives on elements of communication such as argumentation, persuasion, audience, situation, genre, and ethics. Integrated tutorial sections will apply rhetorical theory to the criticism of samples of public communication. Students will exercise their rhetorical skills through in-class activities and assigned writing and oral presentations.

Objectives of the Course

This course will enable a student to do the following:

- understand the principles of classical and modern rhetorical theory,
- craft informative and persuasive spoken and written discourse using these principles,
- analyze the rhetorical acts of others, both in an academic and professional context.
