Course Description

This course emphasizes major critical approaches in Communications Studies with the intent of introducing students to the theoretical foundations of media and mass communication related research. The course explores the contexts in which these theories arose, identifies their major strengths and weaknesses, and provides an appreciation of how critical theory engages the social world through research on communication and media. Areas to be covered include: the problem of ideology, the culture industry (the Frankfurt School), the Canadian school (McLuhan), structuralism and semiotics (Barthes), Cultural Studies (Hall), globalization studies (Appadurai), feminism, poststructuralism (Foucault) and postmodernism (Baudrillard).

Additional Information

- ▲ This is a reading and writing intensive course.
- ▲ The course assumes basic familiarity with communication theories (COMS 201).

Objectives of the Course

The goal of this course is to familiarize students with the major critical theories relevant to media studies. By the end of the course, you should:

- A Be able to recognize and contrast the major authors, concepts and ideas within the critical traditions:
- A Be able to apply them to analyze media texts and practices;
- ▲ Develop a critical awareness of media texts and practices.

Policy for Late Assignments

Assignments submitted after the deadline will be penalized with the loss of a grade (e.g.: A- to B+) for each day late. Late assignments submitted five or more days after the deadline will not be accepted.

Description of assignments

All assignments should follow the APA guidelines for in-text citation and references.

1. Participation (10%)

You are expected to be present for all classes, read assigned texts prior to class, take detailed notes and actively participate in class discussions. Your participation grade will be assessed based on a combination of your substantial and consistent contribution to the discussion of the assigned readings, and your participation in small in-class activities.

2. Group project (10%) – *December 3*, 2013

This assignment tests your ability to critique and challenge media texts. The group project consists of a culture jamming exercise. In groups of four, you will choose a media text (e.g., a print advertisement, a political campaign, a magazine cover, a television ad, a website), provide a critique of its message and re-create it to alter the meaning. Your finished product, along with an analysis of both the original product and your re-created product, will be presented to the class as either a poster or a multimedia presentation. Further details for this assignment will be posted on Blackboard and discussed in class.

3. Quizzes (**30%**) – *October 8, November 5, and December 3, 2013*

This assignment tests your understanding of the required readings and of the material covered in class. Each quiz takes 30 minutes and consists of multiple-choice questions. The quizzes are non-cumulative. For each missed quiz, you will receive zero points.

4. Media analysis journal (20%) – October 8 and November 26, 2013

This assignment tests your understanding of the required readings and of the material covered in class, and your ability to apply them to an analysis of media texts and practices. The journal consists of 4 entries discussing 4 different theories and 4 different media texts or practices (e.g., television show, movie, commercial, magazine cover, newspaper article, etc.). Each entry will use one of the required readings to discuss the respective media text. Further details for this assignment will be posted on Blackboard and discussed in class.

Length: approx. 8 pages, double-spaced.

5. Final project (30%) - Proposal (5%) – *November 19, 2013*; **Final paper (25%) –** *December 6, 2013*

This assignment tests your ability to make use of the theories discussed in this course to provide a substantial evaluation of media texts and practices. The proposal lists the question to be answered in your paper, the specific case to be discussed, and four references. The final paper makes use of one of the critical media theories discussed in this course to examine a specific media text or practice. Further details for this assignment will be posted on Blackboard and discussed in class. Length:

- Proposal 1 page, double-spaced.
- Final paper approx. 15 pages, double-spaced.
