Course Description

COMS 383 is an introduction to the principles, theories, and practices of public relations. The course covers the development of public relations as a professional field, its role in organizations and society today, and future directions of public relations. Topics include public relations research and planning, strategic messaging, ethics, issues management and social media. Case studies will be examined to illustrate challenges and successes of public relations practice.

Assignments and Evaluation

1) Participation: (5%) – Throughout term

In class we will engage in group discussions, your attendance and your participation in these activities will be evaluated.

2) 2 In Class Quizzes: (10% each (x3); 30% of final grade) February 2, March 2, April 6

The questions will be based on readings and lecture materials

3) Final Exam: (20%) – Scheduled by Registrar

There will be a registrar's exam for the course. It will cover all material previous tested on the quizzes.

4) Writing Assignment: (20%) – March 9th

Students will be expected to produce a mock Public Relations document related to readings from the course. The writing assignment will require some secondary source research. Students will not be expected to generate their own questions or research agendas for the assignment.

5) Group presentation: (25%) – April 13

Students will be expected to present on an important Public Relations issue. Class presentations will include some sort of visual presentation, and will also require a "recommended reading" list.

It is the student's responsibility to keep a copy of each submitted assignment. Note: Please hand in your essays directly to your tutor or instructor if possible. If it is not possible to do so, a daytime drop box is available in SS320; a date stamp is provided for your use. A night drop box is also available for after-hours submission. Assignments will be removed the following morning, stamped with the previous day's date, and placed in the instructor's mailbox.
