Course Description and Objectives

In every culture, myth is not simply a collection of stories, but a system that can be seen to have residual effect in a variety of ways. In this course, students will start by reading a collection of Irish myths to ground themselves in the fundamental stories and signs of Irish culture. Students will test the notion that "every culture invents its future by reinventing its past,"¹ by investigating the construction and representation of myth in Irish film, television, advertising, politics, arts, crafts, history, and so on.

Assignments and Evaluation

Research Journal: 40% (2 @ 20%) (Pair Assignment)

Two installments of 1500 words each, indicating installment number and both partners' surnames, will be submitted via Desire2Learn on **18 May** and **27 May**. Each installment should include observations, considerations, and analysis of myth in culture; each installment MUST offer evidence of myth and culture research as described in "Course Description and Objectives." Entries must not be dominated by plot summary or exposition; those that are will be penalized.

Synthesis Grid: 20%

This assignment requires consideration of specific program locations as locations indicative of myth in Irish culture. Although the sites selected for the assignment may not make explicit reference to Irish myth, thoughtful responses will make implicit connections, where superficial jottings will not. This is not a TripAdvisor review. Complete the provided assignment template and submit it via Desire2Learn by **7 June**.
