Course Description

This course will examine the public and private discourses surrounding women and sports. It will discuss the perceptions, stereotypes, and values of female athletes; in particular, media representations and public communication about gender and sport will be analyzed. The rhetorical communication surrounding women in sports will be highlighted in part to determine the impact of gender in the world of athletics

Objectives of the Course

To introduce students to the scholarship regarding the image of women in sports.

To encourage students to think critically about the stereotypes and prejudices that exist in Western society regarding the female athlete.

To empower students to be able to combat above stereotypes and prejudices.

To improve writing skills, research methods, and presentation skills.

To encourage cooperation in group settings.

I/EXAMINATIONS: (Value: 55%)

1. In-class exam February 13, 2014

(This in-class exam will deal with definitions and short answers taken from the material in lectures, readings, discussions, films, and guest speakers.)

2. Take-home exam April 8, 2014

25%

(The take-home exam will consist of only an essay chosen from a list of suggested topics. The list of topics will be handed out to the class on April 8 and the corresponding essay must be handed in by **April 14**, by 4:30 p.m. at my office. Again, the essay will cover material in lectures, readings, discussions, films, and guest speakers.)

II/GROUP PRESENTATIONS: (Value: 20%)

Students will be divided into groups to research a topic area to be decided in consultation with the instructor. 15% of the mark will be based on the group presentation before the class (every group member will receive the same grade). 5% of the grade will be on the handout the group distributes to the class summarizing and highlighting the topic.

Groups 1 and 2 will present on January 30, 2014 Groups 3 and 4 will present on February 4, 2014 Groups 5 and 6 will present on March 11, 2014 Groups 7 and 8 will present on March 13, 2014 Groups 9 and 10 will present on April 1, 2014

III RESEARCH PAPER: (Value: 25%)

Students will write a research paper on a topic related to women and sport. This paper will require the use of primary and secondary (academic) sources. The paper should be 6-8 pages long (double-spaced). Students must use acceptable referencing and bibliography. (APA, MLA, or Chicago Manual of Style are fine.)

Due Date: April 8, 2014

All assignments must be completed or a grade of F may be assigned at the discretion of the instructor.

It is the student's responsibility to keep a copy of each submitted assignment.

Note: Please hand in your essays directly to your tutor or instructor if possible. If it is not possible to do so, a daytime drop box is available in SS320; a date stamp is provided for your use. A night drop box is also available for after-hours submission. Assignments will be removed the following morning, stamped with the previous day's date, and placed in the instructor's mailbox.
