## **Course Description**

This course will examine a series of key questions about technology in our lives centred around the issue "does technology control us or does our society control technology?" Examples of questions the course will explore include the following issues:

- Does technology determine how it is used?
- Does it lead to sustainable abundance or ecological crisis?
- Through technology do we work more or less, in ways that are better or worse?
- Is technology leading toward cultural uniformity or diversity?
- Is technology predictable?

These questions do not have unambiguous answers and the course will invite you to begin from your own experience with technology, analyze aspects of them and develop your own perspectives, aided by insights from lectures and reading drawn from several disciplines.

#### **Objectives of the Course**

At the completion of this course, students will be able to

- Evaluate the roles of technology in contemporary society and how society shapes the technology and those roles.
- Describe and apply theoretical perspectives to technology within contemporary society.
- Debate the challenges and perceived benefits of technology.
- Apply enhanced skills in analytic thinking through written and oral communication.

## **Textbooks and Readings**

David E. Nye *Technology Matters: Questions to Live With*, MIT Press, Cambridge, MA, 2006. (paperback) This text is available on-line at the library, but having a hard copy

(inexpensive, approx. \$20.00) is highly desirable. You will probably want access to it during the Saturday sessions.

The textbook chapters are not long. Additional reading found through the course D2L will accompany topics to give a different perspective and you will need to use library and Internet resources for the term research paper.

#### Internet and electronic communication device information

**In-class tutorial papers:** In addition to lectures, the course will have a series (one each Saturday) of short group assignments based on an issue related to one of the topic questions raised by Nye. These short papers (6 in total) will count for 20% of the course mark.

**Participation:** Four pre-assignments, consisting of 1-5 brief one-sentence answer questions, will be based on the chapters assigned for that day, a hard copy and due at 9am. Four participation marks will be given for peer assessment (during end-of-term presentations), and three participation marks will be given for work completed in class. Ten out of these eleven participation marks will be counted towards the final participation mark (10%).

**Mid-term:** The mid-term of both short answer and essay questions is scheduled for May 30<sup>th</sup>. It will count for 15% of the course mark.

**Group Presentation and Research Report:** There will be a term project assignment based on an analysis of a current or recent *controversy involving the uses of a technology*, identifying the perspectives of the major stakeholder groups and their relationships to each other. These will be completed as group work with a group of four to six participants. The results will be presented briefly in class near the end of term (June 13 and June 20) and a research report (written) will be due the last class (June 20). The presentation will count for 10% of the term mark and the research report for 20%.

**Final Exam:** There will be a registrar-scheduled final examination for this course. It will be a cumulative exam of short answer and essay questions.

#### **Plagiarism**

Using any source whatsoever without clearly documenting it is a serious academic offense. Consequences include failure on the assignment, failure in the course and possibly suspension or expulsion from the university.

You must document not only direct quotations but also paraphrases and ideas where they appear in your text. A reference list at the end is insufficient by itself. In-text citations must be provided, and readers must be able to tell exactly where your words and ideas end and other people's words and ideas begin. Wording taken directly from a source must be enclosed within quotation marks (or, for long quotations, presented in the format prescribed by the documentation style you are using). Paraphrased information must not follow the original wording and sentence structure with only slight word substitutions here and there. These requirements apply to all assignments and sources, including those in non-traditional formats such as Web pages or visual media.
